Neighborhood Beautification

The beauty of the season is perfectly complemented by the quaint, picturesque homes scattered throughout the historic Cottontown community. Our neighborhood is a gem, and enjoying a long walk with family, friends, or pets is one of the many perks we all get to enjoy. As things gear up for backyard bonfires, grilling, and adult-beverage sipping, we're planning more opportunities to improve and/or maintain the beauty of our neighborhood.

We've already tackled several beautification efforts this year. In addition to our regular spring clean-up day, we teamed up with Keep the Midlands Beautiful to facilitate a litter pick-up day along north main. Keep the Midlands Beautiful is a nonprofit organization that provides all the essential equipment and supplies to host a community clean-up day including trash grabbers, bags, and gloves. We had several gracious volunteers who came from both the Elmwood and Cottonwood neighborhoods. By the end of the day, we were able to fill a truck bed to the brim with litter consisting of nearly everything under the sun.

Another exciting initiative taking shape in our community is an effort to convert the diverter at the intersection of Victoria and Bull to a pollinator garden consisting of exclusively native species. Not only will this provide a sanctuary for many of South Carolina's bees, butterflies, and moths—the native species also require less water! This neighbor-led project is an exciting example of how Cottontown can creatively utilize its natural spaces.

Historic Preservation Committee Update

Some of you may remember from the Spring Meeting earlier this year that the Historic Preservation Committee was looking into expanding our National Register boundaries. So, now that we're approaching the Fall Meeting, we wanted to give an update on what we've been working on and how it may affect you. Right now, there are two different "boundaries" within our neighborhood, we have the Bellevue Historic District in the National Register of Historic Places, and the City of Columbia's Historic Preservation Overlay. Both designations provide different benefits to those who are within them, however the city's preservation overlay is what brings about regulation and restrictions to renovations. Right now, the city's overlay extends over the entirety that most people would consider our "neighborhood", but the National Register boundaries fall a bit short. So, to bring about the tax credit benefits provided to those in the National Register, we are attempting to expand those boundaries and include more houses. Most of our expansion will occur on the northside of the neighborhood to Grace St, but other houses that may have not been included in our application in 1997 might be eligible this round, due mostly to construction date or other factors. We are hoping to submit the application by Spring of 2023!
